OUR CHAIRMAN'S LETTER

Dear Friends :

The new state of Free Việt-Nam with a population of more than 11,000,000 is a little larger in area than Georgia. In less than a year, under the able leadership of president Ngô-dinh-Diêm it has become strong. We are happy also to report that the Church of Christ in Việt-Nam, by God's strength, is pressing forward with the message of God's love.

Visiting speakers ministered effectively in evangelism and in Bible teaching. Dick Hillis, of Orient Crusades, inspired a fresh vision of the possibilities of witnessing teams. Later his brother Don was with us. Dr. David Morken conducted meetings in Saigon when many accepted the Lord. One young man, converted in these meetings, helped to open a new church back in his home town many miles

away. Dr. Bob Pierce came at a critical time with a splendid group of speakers. The Church is preparing for this year's General Synod which will meet at Da-Nang (Tourane) in August. Our Foreign Secretary, Rev. L.L. King is to leave America for a visit to Việt-Nam. Sept. 10th. Rev. R.P. Chavan, our brother and colleague from India has just completed ten meetings with great blessing. There is a possibility also that Mr. I. Ben Wati, Executive Secretary of the Evangelical Fellowship of India may visit the field early in September.

Vietnamese and Chinese Gospel Teams are doing excellent work. Another young man has preached and showed pictures to thousands in military camps and in prisons with good results. Groups of preachers are working together in evangelistic effort in their areas. 1165 converts were baptized in 1955. The Vietnamese Church has taken the position that all local congregations are on a self-supporting basis. The Mission program is to intensify its efforts through witnessing bands, opening new areas, publication work and in the Bible Seminary.

Even though the Vietnamese Evangelical Church has more than 120 national workers, 125 churches and outstations, yet most of the nation has not heard the Gospel message. Many places are ready for occupation but we do not have workers. We rejoice that the cities of Hue and Qui-Nhon are being re-occupied by missionaries but others are still waiting. The Bible Seminary at Da-Nang (Tourane) needs a large increase in students. Many churches urgently require rehabilitation help as a result of war damage.

This publication is issued by the Việt-Nam Mission of the Christian and Missionary Alliance. It comes to you as a gift from the missionary whose address is noted on the back. Its purpose is to acquaint you with the work of the Lord in Việt-Nam and to solicit your prayers and support.

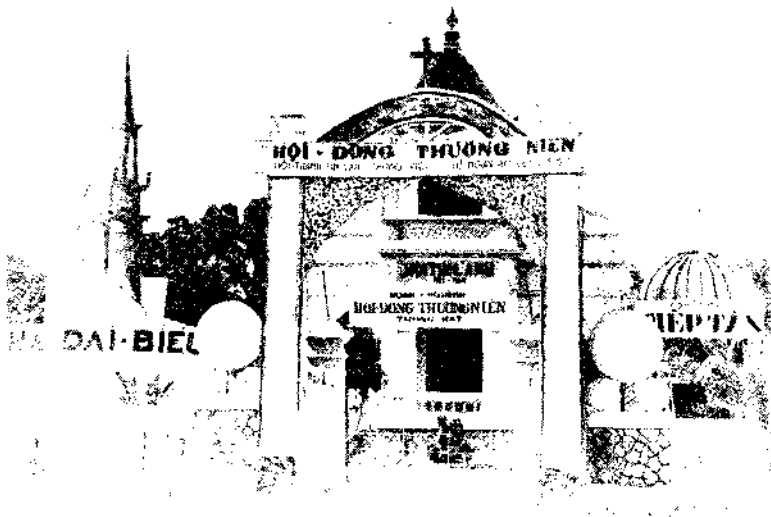
DA-NANG

Part of our ministry this year has been with the churches in the provinces of Quang-Nam and Quang-Ngai. There are many densely populated villages in this area, some of which have christians. We are expecting a lot of aggressive evangelism in these centers.

In the city of Quang-Ngai the church was full and the people showed real interest. Before the war, both this church and the one at Duc-Pho, 40 kilometers further south, were self-supporting and I believe will become so again. The church at Duc-Pho had two prosperous congregations but one of them, at Mo-Duc, was bombed and burned out. The congregations were scattered. Now they are returning but at Mo-Duc there is no church building, only the site with a little scarred rubble of the burned building. We are praying for them that a new work will be opened at this and other large centers in the province where they are still awaiting the Gospel.

In Quang-Nam the need is great! The population is more than a million! Here we have eighteen churches and nine outstations. With the exception of three, all of them were in Viêt-Minh territory until the Geneva « cease-fire » agreement. The persecution and hardships of the people during those years were tremendous. Many of the church buildings were completely destroyed, and most of the christians lost their homes and rice fields. Today they are giving praise for the privilege of worshipping God once more. We had communion in a thatched lean-to on the site of one of these bombed out churches. It was the first time that they had been able to partake of the Lord's supper in eight years. What a time of rejoicing it was, and what a privilege for us to fellowship with these dear children of God who had kept such a joyous testimony through it all. During this past year, the rebuilding of six churches and seven parsonages were completed and three outstations have been built. More than half of these were built with Vietnamese funds. Our slogan has been « self-support, self-government and self-propagation ». This year self-propagation has come to the front and we are trusting and praying that it will increase until a Gospel lighthouse is placed in each village in Viêt-Nam.

After an absence of 15 years Huê (ancient royal capital) is reoccupied by missionaries. Two trips out into the Huê District have revealed the immense areas still to be possessed by the Gospel. After months at Tourane the urge kept coming to push on to Huê, our old station, where we spent nine happy years and where Anne and Tom were both born. After careful deliberation it was agreed that we should move to Huê where a large house, suitable for two families, was rented. It is likely that there is now over a million people living north of Tourane and the city of Huê has not less than two hundred thousand people: crowded now with thousands of refugees. The Christians meet in an old Vietnamese house on a large piece of land which is

their own property. Thousands of cement blocks are stacked high in preparation for the construction of the newly proposed church building.

Huê and the provinces of Thua-Thiên and Quang-Tri will need youth to push into the large unevangelized areas with its scores of villages. To reach many of these areas it is necessary to go either by bicycle or sampan and atoot. The roads have been destroyed except the main national highway. We rejoice that a few new couples are coming this year to help us in this great work.

This coming year our great purpose is to push into the regions beyond and plant churches. Jesus said to His disciples, « I must go to the next villages, for this reason came I forth. »

TOURANE BIBLE SCHOOL

Thanks be to God for permitting us to have another four and a half years of ministry in Viêt-Nam during the most vital period in the history of the Church. The entire term has been spent in the Bible School and has been filled with blessing. The 58 young men and women who came to us for training in Christian service represent a 100 percent increase over the previous class. With the division of the country at the 17th parallel and the consequent 50 percent reduction in the total population from which to draw students, we cannot but feel that this is a direct answer to prayer. Mere quantity should not be the gauge by which to measure progress in spiritual undertakings. Rejoice with us then, that the quality of the student body, both from the intellectual and spiritual levels, was fairly high. A cross-section of the student body reveals that Central and South Viêtnam were equally well represented. The North was also present in the persons of a young couple who for 6 or 8 years lived among the Viêt-Minh colony residing in Siam. A fair proportion of the Central Viêtnam students have also lived for years behind the bamboo curtain.

Practical applications of the principles of personal work and homiletics is afforded the students three days a week when they minister in children's meetings, house to house evangelism and teaching. The first semester included men students visiting 9 villages and towns outside Tourane; distributing over 700 tracts and witnessing to over 800 persons of whom 46 prayed. Girl students held 7 separate classes each week, teaching Bible stories and memory verses to some 1000 saved and unsaved children of whom a number accepted the Lord. Two of the girls helped Mrs. Stebbins once a week in hospital visitation work and reported to having had conversations with 380 individuals of whom 11 prayed. These figures are duplicated if not surpassed each semester.

At the monthly missionary meeting the students have had the privilege of hearing messages from a number of Vietnamese missionaries to the Tribes. In addition there have been recorded messages and slides on the tribes work, all of which have resulted in keeping the missionary spirit high. We praise the Lord that one graduate and five two-year students have received the call to work among these tribes people. They need your earnest intercession for this work.

NHA TRANG

The conference year of 1955-56 was a year of much progress in which we have seen the Holy Spirit working in a manifest way.

Beginning in the North, 300 km. from Nha-Trang we first come to the two large towns of Tam-Quan and Bong-Son with the adjacent countryside. Here there is no work at all and I am sorry to state that we have not been able to reach this section because of the vastness of the Nha-Trang district. Fifteen kilometers south of Bong-Son, though, there is a church where, on Oct. 12 our District Superintendent,

Mr. Ong-van-Trung was taken suddenly ill after holding a baptismal service and went to be with the Lord. It was seen fit at last conference to send a pastor to re-open Qui-Nhon. His accommodations and the chapel were both loaned by christians for a year at no rent until permanent locations could be secured. During the period of five months Mr. Giao has been able to reorganize the church. The offerings came up from zero to nearly 2,000.00 piastres per month and the church felt confident it could support its pastor from now on. When Messrs. Thuc, Dutton, Fitzstevens and I went to Qui-Nhon in February for a series of meetings we were very agreeably surprised with the growth of the work. We were able to hold services not only in Qui-Nhon but also in many areas in the country including Trung-Ai where there were nearly 150 christians gathered and about 60 were baptized. They had gotten land for a church, laid the foundations and were going ahead with plans for the building. We certainly praise the Lord for His working in this area which has the strongest Roman Catholic concentration in all of Central Viêt-Nam.

In the province of Khanh-Hoa there are three churches of which one, Nha-Trang, is self-supporting. At Nha-Trang our work has been chiefly getting out the Sunday School Lessons interspersed with preaching in the Church or outstations with Mr. Lê-van-Long.

In the Phan-Thiét area Messrs. Chan, Fitzstevens, Rexilius, Dieu and Ky have been doing some evangelistic work and many have been saved.

In Phan-Rang the Lord has been blessing and over 400 prayed in the past year. The work among the Cham tribes people is progressing slowly. Mr. Dieu and I have revised about half of the catechism and I hope this next year to perfect my Cham language enough so as to give added emphasis to this phase of the work.

For the past few months I have been impressed with the thought contained in the verses < so neither he who plants nor he who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. He who plants and he who waters are equal and each shall receive his wages according to his labor. For we are fellow-workmen for God. > Each performs his ministry for the greater glory of God and to hasten His return to earth again. During the month of March we held a series of meetings in Tan-Chau. While in that center, we contacted a Tonkinese family that sold wooden shoes in the market place. After a few words of explanation about the Gospel the man, his wife and 21 year old son prayed. We were surprised at the ease with which they accepted the Word and prayed the penitents prayer. Afterwards they told us that they had heard the Gospel in Hanoi almost twenty years ago ; in fact, some of their relatives were Hanoi christians. They had come south about fifteen years ago, and finally in the Tan-Chau market place the Lord caught up with them. This speaks of the faithfulness of Mrs. Homer-Dixon and the Cadmans in bygone days.

During the year several series of meetings have been held in

various villages with many seeking the Lord. At one place, Long-Tiên, fourteen prayed, one being a backslidden christian who comes from an area where there used to be a thriving work, but the christians went through rough seas during the hostilities and most of them backslid. This christian promised to testify to her relatives and friends in her village, and we gave her literature to take back in to them. As yet it is a bit dangerous to enter that area. We feel this was an important contact and it may be the opening needed to reopen that work. We are fortunate to have working with us a Cambodian speaking pastor as well as Mr. Long who speaks several Chinese dialects. It enables us to minister to several language groups during the same series of meetings.

SCHOOLS. A campaign has been launched to reach the children and young people in the schools of Saigon. A gift from the Bible Meditation League enabled us to prepare and print a special tract for this project. Gospels of John and the special booklet for children *Sunshine Country*, are being sold. One of the used Christmas cards is given to each child who buys a Gospel or booklet. This helps greatly to boost sales. Special tracts for the parents of the children are being distributed also.

BOOKROOM. A neon cross and large sign is now over one of the doors of the large Saigon Tabernacle. A voluntary worker is in charge of this depot. He has a good display of Bibles, books, posters and picture rolls and is busy witnessing to inquirers morning, afternoon and evening. A number have accepted Christ as their Saviour.

PUBLICATION. At least five million pages of Gospel literature have been prepared and printed during the past year from special funds received from Home.

HOUSE TO HOUSE TRACT DISTRIBUTION. Gospel tracts have been placed in many homes in Saigon during the past year.

PRISON WORK. Two meetings a week for two different groups of prisoners are being held in the Chi-Hou prison. On two occasions we have been permitted to interview men condemned to die. An open-air service was held in the prison courtyard at Christmas time when many of the prisoners listened attentively over the P.A. system to the message by Lê-van-Thai, President of the Vietnamese church in Viêt-Nam. Some have memorized the entire 14th chapter of John and have received Bibles as a reward. Pastor Phien is now the chaplain of this prison. Over 20 other prisons and camps outside of Saigon have been visited and several thousand have heard the Gospel message and received literature. Hundred's have prayed the penitent's prayer and are now memorizing portions of the Gospel of John. Military hospitals are visited as well with many seeking a refuge in our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

These are days of tremendous opportunities in Viêt-Nam.

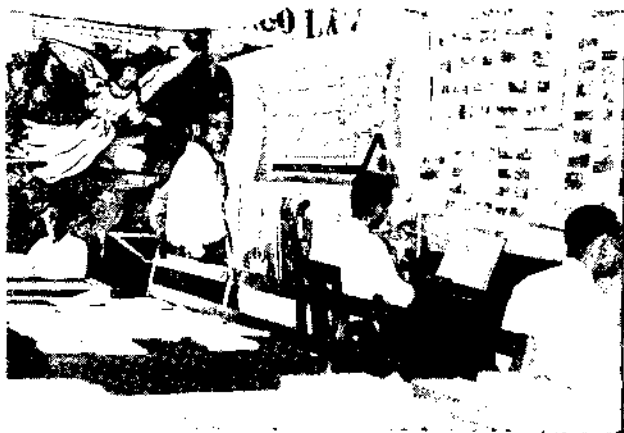

Since last conference the Dalat Gospel Press has ceased to exist and is now the Gospel Press of Saigon. The closing of the Press in Dalat involved the sale of the large press and most of the type. We are thankful to God for providing a buyer for this. The cash sales of the Press, since moving to Saigon, have increased over 300 percent.

Some tracts were printed with Bible Meditation League funds and work is under way on a reprint of another much used tract. Also the Daily Light was completed; a Christmas story color book came off the press at Christmas time; the Life of Christ Visualized, part III and two more volumes of Mr. Cadman's Bible Dictionary are finished. From special funds raised by Mrs. Olsen we have been working on two of Mr. Olsen's books: *Church History*, part III and *I Corinthians*, commentary. The following materials have been done monthly throughout the year:

Thanh Kinh Bao (religious magazine) 1600 copies.

Teacher's quarterly 300 copies.

Adult lessons (published quarterly) 2400 copies.

Children's lessons (published monthly) 1200 copies.

During the year the press has become an authorized book-store, having membership in the Christian Bookseller's Association. Through this means we are able to keep abreast with late publications stateside, and also purchase many materials at a considerable discount. We are now stocking such items as Life of Christ rolls, Heart tract posters, English study and devotional books and Vietnamese and English music recordings. We are hoping to gradually broaden the scope of materials available, but are still limited by the amount of funds that can be invested for this purpose.

We appreciate the help each month of our society and such faithful contributors as the Bible Meditation League and the World Wide Prayer and Missionary Union, also the sending of printed tracts by Mr. Stone of the Pilgrim tract society. These have all filled a very definite need during the past year.

A new building has been rented near the Bible House in Saigon. Here there is adequate space on the ground floor for all press facilities, office and storage. The second floor will be for living quarters. All mail should be addressed to P.O. Box 329, Saigon

**CHINESE WORK
IN
SAIGON-CHOLON
VIET-NAM**

On the outskirts of Cholon there is a tract of land, about an acre and a half, known now as 'Gospel Gardens'. Its house is the residence for our travelling evangelist, Jonathan Kaan, and its fishpond has already yielded a harvest of philippine fish. We have all eaten them without any of the leprosy, T.B. or other bad effects that Communist propoganda has spread about this recently introduced help to Indo-China.

In the past year we have obtained Christian literature from Hong-Kong. Now we feel it is time to take another step of faith and action, and establish a reading and book room in the Saigon-Cholon area. A primary school of about a hundred students has been opened under the sponsorship of the larger Chinese Church. The Gospel truck continues to travel widely in evangelistic work with good results.

There are three Sunday Schools operating now, one at the 'Big Church' under Dr. Leland Wong's organization, one at the Alliance Chapel and a newly opened one at the Chapel where Timothy Leung is pastor. Twice yearly the children gather for V.B.S. with capable and spiritual teachers taking part in all of its activities. Three of your Young People are attending the Alliance Bible Institute in Hong-Kong. Four more are at Nyack, one at Houghton, one in Chicago and several more have gone to Formosa where they are active in S.S. and Church work.

In March we held our third Annual Chinese Conference in Dalat. Mrs. Lau graciously offered the use of her home free of charge to house our eight Chinese workers and their families and as a place to hold our sessions. We are grateful to the Lord for the spirit of love and unity that was present and rejoice in the step forward that causes our Chinese work to be more indigenous in the real sense of the word.

**IN
CAMBODIA**

Due to the fact that the Chinese in Phnom-Penh are without a Church Building, the congregation meets in a Chinese School building under crowded conditions. Between 80 and a 100 attend the Sunday service with perhaps as many children meeting in an adjoining room. It has been a year and eight months since their original Church building burned down, and while efforts have been made to purchase land on which to erect a building, there has been no success to date. We thank God for a Church Body which is comparatively strong and able to administer its own affairs in the City. While without a pastor, it has two able lady evangelists and an active Church Committee which governs the various ministries of the Church. Eleven were added to the church by baptism last October, most of whom were young people. Each week the young people conduct a systematic canvas of the Chinese sections of the city in passing out literature, and witnessing.

SAIGON BUSINESS AGENCY AND HOME

Last year during the time when the National Army was driving the Binh-Xuyen forces out of Saigon, our Saigon Receiving Home property suffered damage. This involved considerable expense and we were grateful for the financial help given by the American Community Church and by the Society.

During the year we have had an unusually large number of guests. Ten families or individuals have returned or newly arrived on the fields. Representatives of FEBC have been entertained. In July and August we had the privilege and joy of sharing in the special Evangelistic efforts of Douglas Sparks and Dr. David Morker of Orient Crusades. More than 300 persons signed decision cards. The follow-up work has been carried on by the coming to Vietnam of Mr. Warren Myers of Orient Crusades who established a Bible Correspondence Course and growing response is seen in the bulging post-office box.

It was a privilege to attend the prison services in Chi-Hoà twice weekly and to teach the prisoners to sing Christmas hymns in preparation for the special program which was held in the large courtyard just before Christmas. Four or five thousand people were able to hear the story of God's love-gift to the world on that occasion.

Since the beginning of January Miss Mack has done a large part of the bookkeeping for the Business Agency and Home and this has lightened our work and enabled us to devote more time to teaching and preaching in the Sunday evening services at the Saigon church. We praise God for several score of people who have accepted Christ during this period.

I was grateful for the opportunity of visiting our former district in Binh-Dinh province (Qui-Nhon) together with Mr. Thuc, Franklin Irwin and John Fitzstevens. We were able to visit a number of cutlying homes and villages and found people eager to hear the Gospel. Nearly 50 decisions were made for Christ during the campaign.

Due to the fact that we have spent a period of 9 years in rehabilitation, Dalat School and in the Receiving Home, we are hoping to be assigned to full time district work when we return from furlough.

ORIENT CRUSADES CORRESPONDENCE COURSE

Mr. Law is our first «grab-bag» correspondence student. He is a young Chinese man who moved from Thailand to Vientiane, Laos. He was raised in a Christian home, says «circumstances made me become a hypocritical Christian. I am afraid that I have no spiritual life in me.» When he got to Vientiane, Mr. Law became spiritually hungry and looked for a Chinese Church, but there was none. He wrote, «therefore I am very sad.»

However in Vientiane, unclaimed mail is piled on a table for all comers to look over. As Mr. Law hopefully looked over this table, he found hidden treasure — an unclaimed Bible study lesson with our address. He wrote, «I was very happy; but there is no one to recommend me to your school. So I write this letter, and ask you to send me one of the lessons, so that I, a young man who am going to fall, may be saved and live the life of Jesus Christ. I am sure you will accept my request.» We did, by airmail.

In some ways Mr. Law is typical of many people, spiritually hungry and wanting a way to study the Bible personally. For almost a year, the Lord has enabled us to conduct correspondence Bible Study and Bible Memory courses from our Saigon office, in Vietnamese, Chinese and English.

Twice in one week recently, young pastors have enthusiastically brought us lessons and booklets completed by their members. One pastor reported 56 out of his 70 members enrolled! The Lord is blessing as increasing numbers begin to memorize God's Word and to study to show themselves approved unto Him as workmen not ashamed. One 60 year old Christian from North Viêt-Nam said «I'm too old to go into the ministry, but I've greatly wanted to study more about Christ to better serve Him. This course has been a great help and blessing.»

Saved and unsaved both, Vietnamese and Chinese, are studying and memorizing the Word of God through these courses. The Study course begins with simple questions from the Gospel of John concerning Jesus Christ, faith and salvation. As a student completes each lesson or booklet, he sends it to us for grading, and then we send him the next step. Soon he is studying basic Christian truths from the whole New Testament and Bible. When he graduates (after 8-9 months), he is awarded a diploma. The Memory Course is the Navigators Topical Memory System, and completion of this course also gives the student a diploma.

These courses have been especially tested and proved throughout the Orient, and have been used to reach many who might otherwise have been unreached with the Gospel or unchallenged to dig into the Word of God for themselves.

Prayer is needed for the students — Christian and non — Christian, and for the Vietnamese co-laborers who correct the lessons.

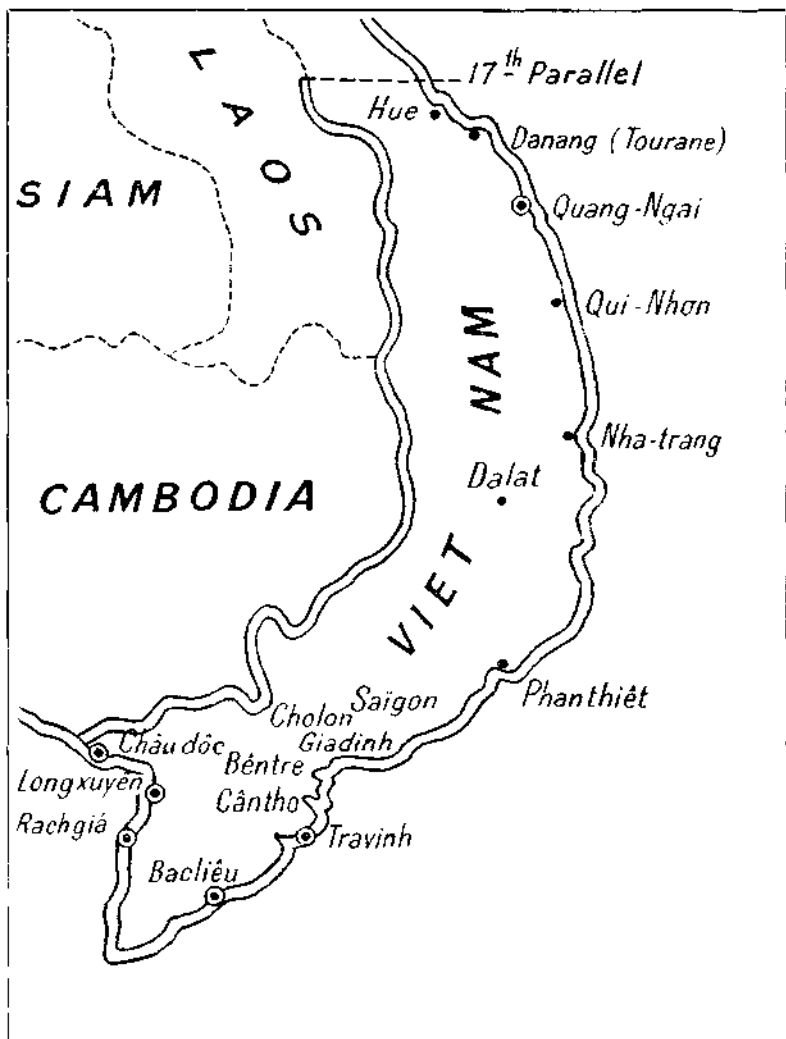
